How to create a new article

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General hints before you begin...

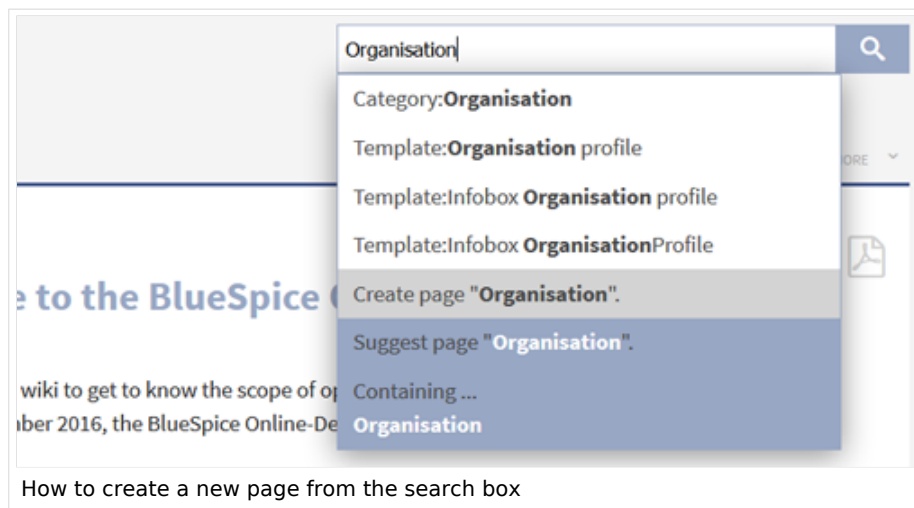
- Before creating a new article, take the time to **find out if a similar article already exists**. Search for the term and possible synonyms, and see if there are any alternate ways of spelling. If you can't find anything: go ahead and create!
- To create an **article in a different namespace**, you have to add the namespace in front of the article name. Example: `[[Desired_namespace:Name_of_the_article]]`
- **Do not use** the following symbols when choosing a name for an article:

{ } & ? < > \ / ,

Three ways to create a new article

Method 1: Via the search function

If your search for an article returned no results, you can use the search box to directly create this article. Simply click on *Create page*, and you will be forwarded to the page to be created.



Method 2: Via the URL

Go to your browser's address bar. You will see something like **http://wiki.bluespice.com/index.php**. Add a slash and the name of the page to be created, and press enter. You will be automatically forwarded to the new page. Example:

`http://wiki.bluespice.com/index.php/New_article`

Method 3: Via a "Red link" in an article

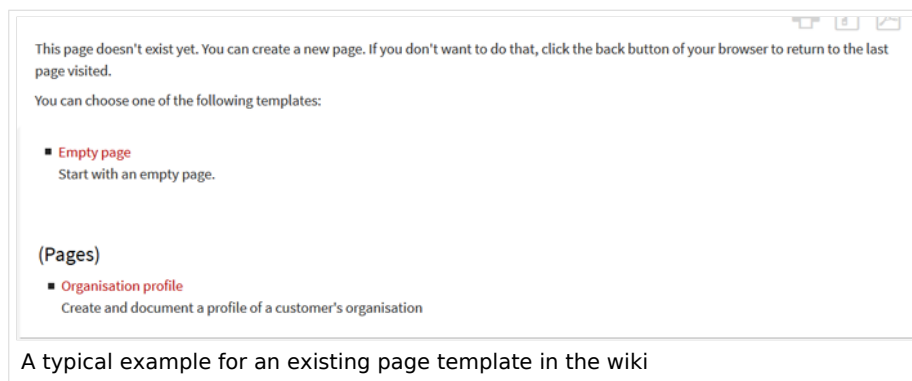
A classic way to create new articles in MediaWiki is by using so-called "red links". These are links in the text of an existing article that link to articles that don't exist yet, and are therefore colored **red** (as opposed to already active links which are colored **blue**).

By the way: you can view a list of all red links in your wiki on the special page **Special:WantedPages**.

Using page templates

Whenever you create a new page in your wiki (regardless of the method used), you will always be forwarded to an overview page where you can choose from different page templates (provided that they have been installed by your administrator). If you don't want to use an existing template, click on *Empty page* or directly on *Create*. You will then be able to add content to the page.

A special type of entry: writing a blog post

BlueSpice also offers a function that allows users to publish news in a blog post. This can e.g. be very useful if you implement the blog feature on your main page, and use it to keep your employees informed on latest developments.

More tips on creating pages

- Avoid using the **back button** of your browser. Many browsers use the page cache to lower loading times, so you may be given an older version of the page. The worst case scenario is that the browser resends data from the edit form to the edit view, overwriting newer changes.
- Do you think that an article will often be searched by using a **synonym**? Add an article with this name and use a [redirect](#)!
- The choice of a **suitable page title** is extremely important. Especially in large wikis it is quite common that authors link existing pages that look like important additional content in their articles without knowing exactly about the content of these pages. You should therefore take great care in choosing a title that is as precise and descriptive as possible. Individual words are often very helpful, but short sentences like "Why wikis work" can also be useful. Besides, descriptive page titles also help readers to navigate and search for entries more easily.
- When linking to an already existing page, take care to spell the title correctly. If e.g. you write `[[hello world]]` instead of `[[HelloWorld]]`, the link will create a new article because the name is spelled differently. So make sure that you take capitalization, spaces and the correct spelling into account!

Manual:Edit existing articles

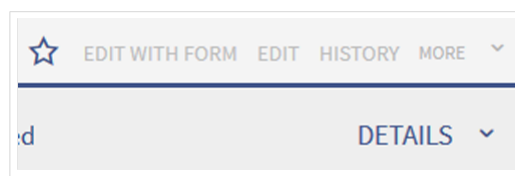
Edit existing articles

Every existing article in a wiki should be modifiable. Simply switch into edit mode, change the contents, and save. Easy!

Entering edit mode

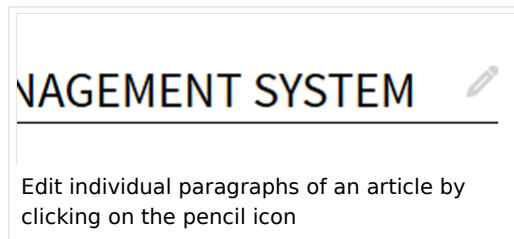
You have two options to edit an article:

1. Click the *Edit* link in the top right corner of the article you want to change. You will be forwarded to the editor where you can alter the complete content of the page. Please note: if your wiki is using forms for editing articles, there is also a *Edit with form* link available.



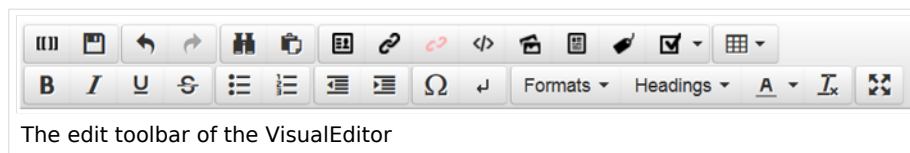
You can find the "Edit" link in the upper right corner of each article

2. If you just want to edit a certain part of the text, it is often easier to use the *edit links* provided by the headlines of the article. Click on the small pencil icon to the right of a headline to modify only the specific paragraph. Especially in longer articles this can save you a lot of time searching for the relevant part you want to change.



Editing

In the edit box you can now modify the article at will, add new or change existing content. Above the edit zone an edit toolbar offers several buttons of the most used Wiki syntax commands. Beside the Wiki syntax you can also work with the Visual editor. Both editors will be covered in detail [here](#).



Preview

With the button *Show preview* you can verify if your changes show up like you expect to. If you scroll down you can still see and use the edit box. So you can change the article little by little, test it and correct it. When you have finished click save. This way you can make sure that the version history of a page doesn't get longer than necessary.

Summary and minor changes

Once you have finished editing the article, make sure you take the time to comment on your changes in the *Summary* box. This comment will appear in the version history of the article, making it easier for other users to understand your reasons for editing the article in the first place.

If you only changed small things in an article (like e.g. the spelling of some words), you can mark your changes as *Minor edits* by tagging the respective box under the summary box. These changes will be marked with an **M** (**M**inor edit) in the version history, as well as in the list of last changes. There is also a separate entry in the user notification system concerning minor edits.

Saving

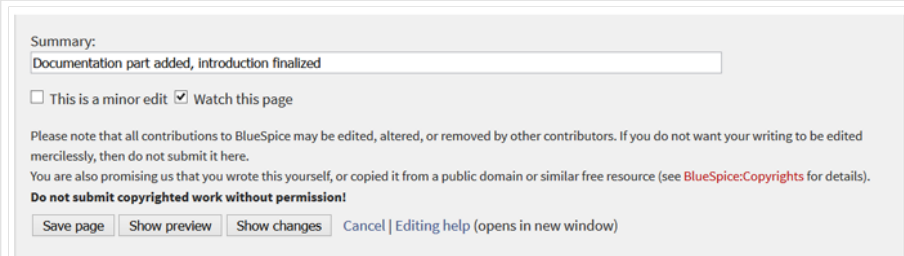
Click on *Save page* to finalize your changes and close the edit view.

Please note: during longer edit session on the same article, it is recommended to make use of the *Show preview* function instead of saving multiple times during the editing, as this will keep the version history as short as possible.

The function [SaferEdit](#) saves the article automatically while you are editing at predetermined intervals.

Other features

- *Watch this page*: tag this box if you want to add the article to your personal [watchlist](#).
- *Show changes*: Click here to compare the article including the changes you made with the original article.
- *Cancel*: Click here to cancel your changes and close the edit view.
- *Editing help*: This link will open a new window showing the most important formatting tags for editing an article with the wikitext editor.
